
WISMAR'S WISDOM

Dear Members and Friends of Holy Cross,

A quick recap: In January's newsletter article, I summarized and reacquainted us with the **Strategic Ministry Plan (VISION 2020)** that we had created in the months of 2016-2017. The **two key questions** that got the ball rolling for us were: DO YOU KNOW WHERE HOLY CROSS IS GOING? WHAT WILL HOLY CROSS LOOK LIKE IN THE YEAR 2020 AND BEYOND? In February's newsletter article I focused in on our Theme Statement that resulted from our efforts, **"RECEIVING GOD'S LOVE AND ACTIVELY RESPONDING,"** and I pointed out that this is the fundamental relationship between God and us – God gives, and His people receive. God acts, and we react. In March's newsletter article I reiterated our Vision Statement, **"We will live together as the Body of Christ: a loving family actively engaged with one another, our community and the world"** and the fact that both statements shared an important word in common, the word **"ACTIVELY."** **"ACTIVELY RESPONDING..."** **"ACTIVELY ENGAGED..."** The word **"ACTIVELY"** means doing things in a deliberate and positive way, doing things in an energetic and vigorous way – with the aim of making something happen, rather than just hoping that it will.

How do we do this? This brings us to our Goals (both Strategic and SMART), which are the things that we want to be actively accomplishing. The following is the list of Strategic Goals we articulated for ourselves. We want to:

- Seek the "lost" and/or "drifting"
- More joyfully give of time, talent and treasure
- Expand our youth ministry, service and activities
- Engage young families
- Feed our souls (grow in Christ, Christian speakers, sermons, retreats, etc.)
- Serve our community (including Trumbull)
- Get the word out regarding HCLC—be positively recognized in the community
- Create a deeper "culture of caring"—internal and external
- Address financial issues
- Get *everyone* involved



We then put in a lot of time turning these general, Strategic Goals into SMART Goals, which is the topic I would like to briefly speak with you about this month. SMART Goals clarify exactly what is expected and the measures used to determine if the goal is achieved and successfully completed. First, a quick recap on what a SMART Goal is:

- ✓ **Specific:** Linked to position summary, departmental goals/mission, and/or overall School of Medicine goals and strategic plans. Answers questions such as Who? What? Where? When? Why? Which?
- ✓ **Measurable:** The success toward meeting the goal can be measured. Answers the question—How?
- ✓ **Attainable:** Goals are realistic and can be achieved in a specific amount of time and are reasonable. A goal will seem much more attainable if you can break it down into steps. Each step should be one that moves you closer to that goal.
- ✓ **Relevant:** The goals are aligned with current tasks and projects and focus in one defined area; include the expected result.
- ✓ **Time framed:** Goals have a clearly defined time-frame including a target or deadline date.





Feeling uplifted by a workshop, I urge renewal and dedication by our members

LOOKING DEEPER INTO THE BIBLE

Lesson 16: Understanding 1st Corinthians, Chapter 7

A monthly Bible study involving Scripture reading and explanation, verse by verse

We begin with The Reading: 1st Corinthians, Chapter 7 (RSV)



Sexual morality—Marriage and celibacy; 1. Principles of marriage

¹Now concerning the matters about which you wrote. It is well for a man not to touch a woman. ²But because of the temptation to immorality, each man should have his own wife and each woman her own husband. ³The husband should give to his wife her conjugal rights, and likewise the wife to her husband. ⁴For the wife does not rule over her own body, but the husband does; likewise the husband does not rule over his own body, but the wife does. ⁵Do not refuse one another except perhaps by agreement for a season, that you may devote yourselves to prayer; but then come together again, lest Satan tempt you through lack of self-control. ⁶I say this by way of concession, not of command. ⁷I wish that all were as I myself am. But each has his own special gift from God, one of one kind and one of another. ⁸To the unmarried and the widows I say that it is well for them to remain single as I do. ⁹But if they cannot exercise self-control, they should marry. For it is better to marry than to be aflame with passion.

Sexual morality—Marriage and celibacy; 2. The Christian and divorce

¹⁰To the married I give charge, not I but the Lord, that the wife should not separate from her husband ¹¹(but if she does, let her remain single or else be reconciled to her husband)--and that the husband should not divorce his wife. ¹²To the rest I say, not the Lord, that if any brother has a wife who is an unbeliever, and she consents to live with him, he should not divorce her. ¹³If any woman has a husband who is an unbeliever, and he consents to live with her, she should not divorce him. ¹⁴For the unbelieving husband is consecrated through his wife, and the unbelieving wife is consecrated through her husband. Otherwise, your children would be unclean, but as it is they are holy. ¹⁵But if the unbelieving partner desires to separate, let it be so; in such a case the brother or sister is not bound. For God has called us to peace. ¹⁶Wife, how do you know whether you will save your husband? Husband, how do you know whether you will save your wife?

Sexual morality—Marriage and celibacy; 3. The status quo

¹⁷Only, let every one lead the life which the Lord has assigned to him, and in which God has called him. This is my rule in all the churches. ¹⁸Was any one at the time of his call already circumcised? Let him not seek to remove the marks of circumcision. Was any one at the time of his call uncircumcised? Let him not seek circumcision. ¹⁹For neither circumcision counts for anything nor uncircumcision, but keeping the commandments of God. ²⁰Every one should remain in the state in which he was called. ²¹Were you a slave when called? Never mind. But if you can gain your freedom, avail yourself of the opportunity. ²²For he who was called in the Lord as a slave is a freedman of the Lord. Likewise he who was free when called is a slave of Christ. ²³You were bought with a price; do not become slaves of men. ²⁴So, brethren, in whatever state each was called, there let him remain with God.

Sexual morality—Marriage and celibacy; 4. Counsel to the unmarried

²⁵Now concerning the unmarried, I have no command of the Lord, but I give my opinion as one who by the Lord's mercy is trustworthy. ²⁶I think that in view of the present distress it is well for a person to remain as he is. ²⁷Are you bound to a wife? Do not seek to be free. Are you free from a wife? Do not seek marriage. ²⁸But if you marry, you do not sin, and if a girl marries she does not sin. Yet those who marry will have worldly troubles, and I would spare you that. ²⁹I mean, brethren, the appointed time has grown very short; from now on, let those who have wives live as though they had none, ³⁰and those who mourn as though they were not mourning, and those who rejoice as though they were not rejoicing, and those who buy as though they had no goods, ³¹and those who deal with the world as though they had no dealings with it. For the form of this world is passing away. ³²I want you to be free from anxieties. The unmarried man is anxious about the affairs of the Lord, how to please the Lord; ³³but the married man is anxious about worldly affairs, how to please his wife, ³⁴and his interests are divided. And the unmarried woman or girl is anxious about the affairs of the Lord, how to be holy in body and spirit; but the married woman is anxious about worldly affairs, how to please her husband. ³⁵I say this for your own benefit, not to lay any restraint upon you, but to promote good order and to secure your undivided devotion to the Lord.



Sexual morality—Marriage and celibacy; 5. Asceticism and marriage

³⁶If any one thinks that he is not behaving properly toward his betrothed, if his passions are strong, and it has to be, let him do as he wishes: let them marry--it is no sin. ³⁷But whoever is firmly established in his heart, being under no necessity but having his desire under control, and has determined this in his heart, to keep her as his betrothed, he will do well. ³⁸So that he who marries his betrothed does well; and he who refrains from marriage will do better.

Sexual morality—Marriage and celibacy; 6. Counsel to widows

³⁹A wife is bound to her husband as long as he lives. If the husband dies, she is free to be married to whom she wishes, only in the Lord. ⁴⁰But in my judgment she is happier if she remains as she is. And I think that I have the Spirit of God.

We move into The Study: A reminder that Corinth was the business center of Greece, and Paul had visited and preached to the people there during his second missionary journey. His first letter to the Corinthians addresses the problems of Christians in a local church, primarily their relationships with one another.

Chapter 6 had been Paul’s sermonizing about sexual morality and had included a short section on the standards of the kingdom. The final Chapter 6 section discussed chastity. By shunning immoral behavior, Paul is telling the Corinthians they recognize their bodies are the temple of God. He urges them to glorify God in their bodies. The topic of sexual morality had begun with Chapter 5 and it wraps up in a somewhat long Chapter 7. The Bible is the original self-help book, and in Chapter 7 Paul answers questions about marriage problems, widows, being single and sexual sin, issues that were relevant in his time and remain so today.

In Verses 1-7, he addresses “matters” that the Corinthians brought up themselves. Paul says marriage was begun by God as the joining of a man and woman for life; they should give to each other conjugal rights since neither has “authority over” their own body but the other does. The intimacy of a man and wife must be actively considered; if one wants to be inactive the other must be in agreement. But Paul recommends not making the inactivity permanent since that might tempt a partner to seek intimacy elsewhere. He himself says he has the ability to refrain with self-control, but because we are all different, he says his way is not everyone’s way.

Beginning with Verse 8, he suggests that singles and the widowed remain content with that status, but only if they practice self-control. If not, get married, he says. From Verses 10-16, Paul addresses the married, that they should not separate or divorce, which is not his command, but God’s. When a believing partner lives with an unbeliever, Paul says, the unbeliever becomes holy, meaning in essence that a marriage can save a partner.

Beginning with Verse 17 through 24, the hymn phrase “just as I am” comes to mind; when Christ calls someone, they are to come just as they are. Paul says that in “whatever condition you were called,” remain in it for God.

In Verses 25-35, Paul has interesting advice for the unmarried. He says he brings no command of God, and that as a man of continence, he sees no problem with those who want to remain single. He doesn’t ask that those who are married seek to be free, but he makes the point that when you get married, you become distressed. If only he knew, those of us who are married say, right!? His main point about being single is that it frees a person to devote their life to God, which is a good idea due to what he hints is imminent: the coming of Christ. And Paul goes on to make the case starting in Verse 32 that being single helps one focus on pleasing God; to the contrary, being married distracts one’s attention away from God to a spouse and the world. Paul absolves himself of appearing anti-marriage by writing in 35, “I say this for your own benefit, not to lay any restraint upon you, but to promote good order and to secure your undivided devotion to the Lord.” But when he writes in Verse 38 that the unmarried will do better than the married, he’s clearly stating his position on the whether he feels it’s better to be single or be married.
