

FROM OUR INTERIM PASTOR

Dear Members & Friends of Holy Cross,

Greetings in our Lord, Jesus Christ! I'm writing this letter on March 15, the first Sunday on which so many of us have ever been affected – apart from a snowstorm's aftermath – by the cancellation of a Lord's Day worship service. It was a new experience to spend Sunday morning alone with Christine reading online devotions and listening in to streaming worship services that aired without congregations being present. I know you join me in looking forward to the time when reasonable normalcy can be restored not only to our worship patterns, but also to our day-to-day lives.

Today my wife and I took a long walk together on the grounds of the now vacant Fairfield Hills Hospital complex in Newtown, mindful the whole time of the guidelines that have been promulgated by the Center for Disease Control. A lot of



individuals and families were also out on this beautiful, crisp afternoon, many with strollers and some with four-legged family members. All the walkers, runners, and cyclists seemed to be aware of the "social distancing" requirements of the present moment, with many maintaining a wide berth motivated by either compliance or fear.

As this Lenten season draws to a close and Christians anticipate the observance of Holy Week and Easter, it is becoming clearer and clearer that things are going to be very different this year. In fact, I'm not sure that any of us can yet appreciate all the implications of our current challenge. What we do know is that certain things never change. Each of us needs to know that we matter to God and others, each of us needs to love and to be loved, and each of us absolutely needs the grace, forgiveness, and reconciliation that is ours through Jesus Christ.

The world stands in need of contagious Christianity even as it fears the contagion of viral threat. Some two thousand years ago, our Lord's first followers began to bear witness to the message first announced by an angelic messenger: "He is not here. He has risen." It began a movement that changed the world as the Holy Spirit gave life to their message and faith was multiplied among those who heard. That message is the one that still gives life. We who have been claimed by that faith are still called to be bearers of that message, giving positive contagion through acts of mercy, signs of love, words of encouragement, and peaceful presence.

Our social contacts are limited right now, but opportunities shall increase as we look for opportunities to witness to Jesus. Easter may be different this year, but we are Easter people who speak of life and hope in the midst of despair and change. External circumstances may be growing more challenging, but we have a Lord who has, through His resurrection, defeated death, sin, and evil. We are, as the apostle Paul wrote, "more than conquerors through Him who loved us."

Contagious Easter people - such is our call!



<u>A Bit of Shrovetide Trivia:</u> These traditions began in the Middle Ages (10th-11th Ages) as religious requirement. The word Shrove means absolution or forgiveness. Fasting was required during Lent, and eggs, milk, fat, cream and sugar were the items forbidden during this 40-day period. During SHROVETIDE the people tried ways to use up these rich food ingredients used in their homes. As Edith Skoog wrote, "As you enter the Lenten season, though it is a solemn time of repentance, you can rejoice in the fact that you are "SHRIVEN."

Some thoughts from our Interim Pastor

I believe the tithes, offerings, and gifts of God's people in worship to be the moment of blessed convergence of our need to give and the church's need to be supported in its mission to a world in need. It is a profound act of worship when we Christians give in a manner that is generously proportionate to God's gifts in our lives. The scriptures teach that *God loves a cheerful giver (2 Corinthians 9:7)*. Then, as members of the body of Christ localized in a particular congregation, our gifts propel mission and ministry in and from that place.

On behalf of all here and beyond who benefit from the ministry and outreach of Holy Cross, thank you to all who are continuing to show thanks to God through their timely offerings despite the fact that we are in a season of necessary distance.

The world is a changing place! Not too many years ago, I was not in favor of automated giving. For me, writing the weekly check to be placed physically in the offering became a moment to reflect regularly on God's blessings and to set life's priorities in a God-pleasing way. I will likely continue doing that. I have come to see, however, that a growing number of people (particularly those far younger than I) hardly ever write checks, pay their bills online, make bank transfers without going to the bank, and so on. Certainly God is just as pleased with offerings electronically transferred as with paper checks. In fact, electronic transfer may make more sense in this time of "social distancing."

Our Financial Secretary, Chad Helminger, has prepared step-by-step instructions for online giving that leads you to the place on the Holy Cross webpage where you can arrange for immediate and ongoing offerings to support the work we share in this congregation. These instructions have been sent out via recent e-mail blasts, or you may contact the church office and the pdf of these instructions will be emailed to you. For those well-versed on technology you may not need the instructions; simply go to our website – holycrosstrumbull.org – and scroll to the bottom of the "welcome" page, click on the green oval "To Donate click here" and follow the prompts. Thank you for considering this opportunity, for maintaining or increasing your thank offerings, and for the part you play in our life together at Holy Cross.

BUILDING OUR CONGREGATIONAL COMMUNITY DURING SOCIAL DISTANCING

Consider this proposal for how you can enhance our Christian ties

It can be challenging to retain our equilibrium, even our spiritual equilibrium, when so much of what makes us a Christian community has been rendered impossible for a season. We are accustomed to gathering for prayer and worship, but now we need to do these things in a different way.

<u>Here's a proposal and suggestion</u>. Please prayerfully consider doing this, and as you're led to do so, do it! Together let's make the most of our current challenge and build up our congregational community through prayer and love.

- 1. Identify three Holy Cross individuals or households, at least one of which you may not know very well, and begin to pray for them intentionally and daily.
 - a. Pray for their wellness: physical, spiritual, emotional, and relational.
 - b. Pray that they not lose heart during the Covid-19 challenge.
 - c. Pray for those who love them, that each may know the support of others.
 - d. Pray that, over time, you come to know them or to know them better.
- 2. After a few days, contact them by telephone or email to let them know you are praying for them. Ask whether there is anything in particular for which you might offer prayer.
- 3. After a week or two, send them a card or note of encouragement.
- 4. See if you can commit to having a visit together coffee or something else once the crisis is behind us.
- 5. Continue, over time, to be connected in some way. And continue to pray for the life of our entire congregation!
