## WISMAR'S WISDOM

**Dear Members and Friends of Holy Cross,**

**"WHO AM I?" "WHAT AM I DOING HERE?"** These are the big questions that eventually confront everyone. Usually these two questions begin to nag us in childhood. Aware of a wide universe and seeking to grasp his or her place within it, a child asks and wonders. The questions do not go away with time. Perhaps the nagging can be quelled or covered with distractions and with rationalizations. **But the questions refuse to go away – they demand an answer.**

The answer to these questions will be the topic for a **Bible study** that I will be offering at two different times throughout the coming months (which I will list at the end of my article). But first, a little more on the study itself. The universe, God's will, speaking the Christ story, true human fulfillment, God's Law, the point of it all – these are just some of the ideas that will be covered in this explorative video Bible study. In six sessions, we will be taken from the beginning to that place where, on the Last Day, we find our greatest realization as humans.

This series (which I forgot to mention, is also titled **"WHO AM I?" "WHAT AM I DOING HERE?"**) is essentially about us being God's creatures, redeemed by Christ and restored through faith. Our role is to fulfill God's place for us within His creation. God's Law involves the ordering and function of His creation throughout the universe. Our sin perverts our grasp and understanding of God's will for His creation.



**Accepting that God is in charge in all things is not a popular idea among modern people.** God's purposes are accomplished – and His creatures thrive best – when living coherently within His design. We are all here to do what God put us here to do. Though our vocations are many, church work does not supersede family responsibilities and other necessary obligations. We fit into God's creation and His scheme of things, not vice versa.

God's law is good. His will for His people is that they speak the Gospel message and share the life of Jesus Christ with others. Proclamation is paramount, not optional. The Last Day fulfills God's will for the earth and its creatures; it doesn't conclude world history but redeems and restores this planet. **The point of our lives is to live as God's creatures.**

**"WHO AM I?" "WHAT AM I DOING HERE?"** These questions demand an answer...**and God has the answers.** Using what God has revealed, this study will provide honest and straightforward answers to these twin questions. God does not leave us desolate, wondering who we are. He does not condemn us to grope in the dark, seeking meaning in life. People are not left to determine their own truth or stumble through their days without direction. This study will explore what God has revealed about life's biggest questions. They will shed light on the difference that knowing the answers makes for the way we live. And it does make a difference – a profound difference. The answers are waiting. **God is ready to tell you not only who you are but also what you're doing here.**

This six-session study will be offered on Wednesdays from 10:30-11:30 a.m., on the following dates: *FEBRUARY 13 and 27; MARCH 13 and 27; and APRIL 10 and 24* – all people are invited to these Wednesday morning sessions. It will also be offered as a Men's-Only Bible study on Saturdays from 7:00-8:00 a.m. on the following dates: *FEBRUARY 2 and 23; MARCH 16 and 30; and APRIL 13 and 27.* **I look forward to seeing you there!**


### **Ordinary Time: Sharing my practice**

As much as I love the preparation and celebration of the rich and joyful noise of the Christmas and New Year holiday season, I embrace the post-holiday space, and practice an especially quiet daily meditation. We are in Ordinary Time, the stretch of days between Epiphany and Ash Wednesday. I am inspired to reflect and not react to the stimulus around me, a little easier to do in this quiet season. My daily devotional readings, including silent meditation, are just as important as attending worship services. This practice is an integral part of my day.

Here is the challenge: Both trivial and important things clutter our lives. This can be a barrier to our relationship with and service to God and each other. To allow being and not doing, to be quiet, allows the noise to settle, the clutter to clear so we may fully hear God. Read your devotions and scripture. Take 15 minutes to sit in a comfortable position; acknowledge and let go of thoughts. If you have not done this before, you may feel an urge to bolt, telling yourself, "I can't sit still like this." Not true; you can – that's why it's called a practice.

Let me know what you do. What is your daily practice? I am always a beginner when it comes to prayer, devotion, Scripture, and our lives are enriched by how we practice our faith.



## 2019 ANNUAL MEETING REVIEW

### **Holy Cross conducts its church business, appoints new officers and approves budgets for 2019**

Holy Cross Lutheran Church fulfilled its constitutional obligation and held its Annual Voters' Meeting on Sunday, January 27. Among the highlights of business conducted: electing a slate of officers for seven positions, approving 2019 financial budgets for the church and preschool, and nominating individuals for three positions up for election at the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod convention later this year.

Shortly after the proceedings were called to order at 12:13 p.m. in the Froehlich Fellowship Hall by president Michele A. Vichiola-Van Wart—with 58 voting members having signed the registry—seven positions were filled with the election of officers. Elected officers who were incumbents and stayed on in their positions were Greg Dowling (Treasurer), Cliff Schrock (Secretary), Dan Senft (Property), Stephanie Helminger and Kendra Norman (co-directors of Social Ministry), and Gary Messerschmitt (Technology). David Bogen was elected to be Evangelism Director, succeeding Jon Halls, and Hugh Hughes, who had just completed his three-year term as lead shepherd, was elected to return as the incoming Shepherd. The lead shepherd for 2019 is Gary Jackson; in his second year as Shepherd is Charles Senft Jr. With this year's election mainly comprised of incumbents, it was a departure from the 2018 election when five newcomers were elected to serve on the Board in the positions of Financial Secretary, Worship, Discipleship, Education and Shepherd. Mr. Hughes was announced as meeting Parliamentarian at the start of the proceedings. A financial-review team was not announced at this time.

The meeting attendees gathered in the hall after the end of the 10:30 a.m. service; the Board of Directors had done room set-up and food preparation, organized by Kendra Norman. After the call to order, Pastor Wismar said a prayer, and Sally Finck played piano as the attendees sang LSB hymn number 783, "Take My Life and Let It Be." The President then welcomed the members and said some opening remarks; she thanked Mary Schrock in the church office for her work and helpfulness; thanked previous president Kerry Geffert for guidance; thanked the Board of Directors for their assistance during 2018, and gave a universal thank you to all the church volunteers. The 2018 Annual Meeting Minutes were next on the agenda and the attendees voted to approve the minutes as presented.

For the next agenda item, commission directors were not brought forward to give reports on their 2018 activities. Instead, Office Administrator Mary Schrock had prepared the Annual Report ahead of time and anyone attending the meeting had been asked by the President to read commission reports and come prepared with any observations/questions. There were no comments or discussion from the assembly about the 2018 report or commission business. There were questions about recent appliance needs and about the church possibly going to one service year-round. The church had a new refrigerator installed, and the parsonage a new dryer. Dan Senft reported via a phone call that \$300 had been collected toward the refrigerator cost of \$700; donations were welcome toward the \$500 dryer cost. He also reported on a new security system that \$10,000 had been given as a deposit for work that would likely start in March. Regarding one service, the President said there had been no decision made at this time; the Board is not in agreement yet and facts still need to be gathered. (See later note.) Vice President Val Huydic then reported on the Crisis Action Plan, copies of which were on tables for reading. She then led the election-of-officers agenda item, presenting the full slate noted above. The assembled approved accepting the slate of officers as presented.


Next for presentation were financial reports and the budgets for 2019. The voters approved a balanced church budget of \$308,218.62 for both income and expenses, and a preschool budget of \$179,631.86 for expenses and \$179,862.00 for income for a surplus of \$230.14. The church financial number represents a 0.55 percent increase over 2018. The budget approvals came after comprehensive presentations by Financial Secretary Chad Helminger and Treasurer Greg Dowling on 2018 financial figures. Using a prepared sheet, Mr. Helminger summarized that "overall, giving [for the church] was slightly higher than the prior year [2017]. However, it was less than the estimated needs to fund our mission at Holy Cross." Mr. Dowling reported that for the Preschool, 2018 income was roughly \$16,000 short of budget but that the actual expenses were roughly \$13,000 short of budget for a surplus of nearly \$8,000. Mr. Dowling said the church and preschool had managed expenses well and that there had been two main problem expenses: snow plowing and tree removal. The approved 2019 budgets included a 2.0 percent salary increase for all staff, which is what the New England District issued as a recommendation.

In synod election business, the members voted to send the names of seven individuals as candidates for officer election. And in new business, it was voted to form a committee to evaluate the impact of going to a one-service worship schedule.

Adjournment of the meeting took place at 2:02 p.m., preceded by a closing prayer by Pastor Wismar. (Additional reporting about the meeting will be expanded upon in the meeting minutes prepared by Board of Directors Secretary Cliff Schrock.)

## LOOKING DEEPER INTO THE BIBLE

### Lesson 25: Understanding 1st Corinthians, Chapter 16

A monthly Bible study involving Scripture reading and explanation, verse by verse

**We begin with The Reading:** 1st Corinthians, Chapter 16 (RSV)



#### **Personal matters: The Collection for the Saints**


<sup>1</sup>Now concerning the contribution for the saints: as I directed the churches of Galatia, so you also are to do. <sup>2</sup>On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as he may prosper, so that contributions need not be made when I come. <sup>3</sup>And when I arrive, I will send those whom you accredit by letter to carry your gift to Jerusalem. <sup>4</sup>If it seems advisable that I should go also, they will accompany me.

#### **Paul's Plans for Travel**

<sup>5</sup>I will visit you after passing through Macedo'nia, for I intend to pass through Macedo'nia, <sup>6</sup>and perhaps I will stay with you or even spend the winter, so that you may speed me on my journey, wherever I go. <sup>7</sup>For I do not want to see you now just in passing; I hope to spend some time with you, if the Lord permits. <sup>8</sup>But I will stay in Ephesus until Pentecost, <sup>9</sup>for a wide door for effective work has opened to me, and there are many adversaries. <sup>10</sup>When Timothy comes, see that you put him at ease among you, for he is doing the work of the Lord, as I am. <sup>11</sup>So let no one despise him. Speed him on his way in peace, that he may return to me; for I am expecting him with the brethren. <sup>12</sup>As for our brother Apol'los, I strongly urged him to visit you with the other brethren, but it was not at all his will to come now. He will come when he has opportunity.

#### **Paul Ends His Letter: Final Messages and Greetings**

<sup>13</sup>Be watchful, stand firm in your faith, be courageous, be strong. <sup>14</sup>Let all that you do be done in love. <sup>15</sup>Now, brethren, you know that the household of Steph'anas were the first converts in Acha'ia, and they have devoted themselves to the service of the saints; <sup>16</sup>I urge you to be subject to such men and to every fellow worker and laborer. <sup>17</sup>I rejoice at the coming of Steph'anas and Fortuna'tus and Acha'icus, because they have made up for your absence; <sup>18</sup>for they refreshed my spirit as well as yours. Give recognition to such men. <sup>19</sup>The churches of Asia send greetings. Aqu'ila and Prisca, together with the church in their house, send you hearty greetings in the Lord. <sup>20</sup>All the brethren send greetings. Greet one another with a holy kiss. <sup>21</sup>I, Paul, write this greeting with my own hand. <sup>22</sup>If any one has no love for the Lord, let him be accursed. Our Lord, come! <sup>23</sup>The grace of the Lord Jesus be with you. <sup>24</sup>My love be with you all in Christ Jesus. Amen.



**We move into The Study:** A reminder once more that Corinth was the business center of Greece, and Paul had visited and preached to the people there during his second missionary journey. This first letter to the Corinthians addressed the problems of Christians in a local church, primarily their relationships with one another.

To review, this letter had seven sections: Introduction, Divisions, Sexual Morality, Christian Liberty, Public Worship, The Resurrection, and this final chapter, Personal Matters. Throughout, there have been no problems in First Corinthians that Paul hasn't given answers for. And now in this last chapter, he doesn't want to say goodbye on a sad note, but he ends like most letters should end, with summary and plans – and an uplifting tone!

In giving to the church, the focus is on the poor, and Paul describes the process for how to do it, with the same instructions he gave the Galatians. Everyone is to set aside their contribution at the start of the week, on a regular basis, depending on how each person prospers.

Next, he gives them a timeframe for when he will be traveling, at what time and how long he would be staying. But this is not a leisurely visit to Corinth. He mentioned specific individuals and describes plans that he has so his visit is profitable. Making sure of things, he tells them Timothy may precede him but to not be haughty so that he is not fearful or faces resistance. Let things go well with his visit so he may join Paul in good manner.

Like a coach giving his team a final pep talk, Paul stresses alertness, firmness, courage, strength and love in a parting exhortation. He mentioned Stephanas, Fortunatus and Achaicus and wants them respected as in a leadership position. They had been part of a group that brought a letter from the Corinthian church to Paul for him to read and he wants the Corinthians to treat them as leaders and be subject to them. He also refers to the Christian churches as being universally one whole unit, including the churches of Asia; every church shares love with each other. In verse 22, “let anyone be accursed” who has no love for the Lord is an awful reminder that those who do not love God are doomed.


**WORDS FOR YOUR CHRISTIAN JOURNEY**
