FROM OUR INTERIM PASTOR

Dear Members and Friends of Holy Cross,

Greetings in our Lord, Jesus Christ!

If there's anything that our observations of Christmas and Epiphany "bring home" for us, it is that we have been immensely gifted by God. We're reminded of the gifts not only in the secular sense of seasonal gift-giving, but especially in the divine sense that the gift of the Incarnate Lord Jesus is the greatest of God's gifts. It is in Jesus alone that we find the gifts of forgiveness, reconciliation to God, peace, and the promise of eternity.

The gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh that were brought to the Christ Child by visitors from afar were their response when they recognized who Jesus was and what His life would mean for the world.

What about us?

We often make of it an *abstract theological thought* when we cite the familiar words from the third chapter of John's gospel:

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." (John 3:16)

It is, however, no mere abstraction. The world for which God gave His Son is nothing other than the world we know – family members, friends, co-workers, neighbors, strangers, ones we see as "normal" and the ones we see as "quirky;" in a word, it's everyone. The gift is for them, for they are "the world." God has shown His grace to all as He gifted us all with His very best.

So what about us? What shall we do about it?

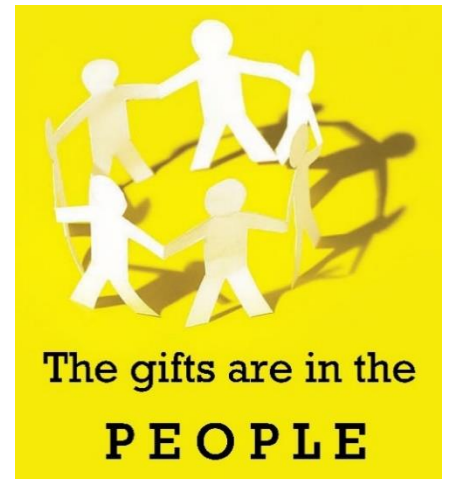
One of my most valued colleagues in the work of the church is a Director of Christian Education with whom I worked in Rochester, N.Y., for several years. Daryl Pichan remains a close friend, and often reminds any and all who would hear that "the gifts are in the people." That is to say that God has gifted His church through the gifts and talents that He showers among the church's people. As the people of God come together to be the church and to deploy their gifts as congregations, His will is done and His mission advanced. People are served. The gospel is shared. His church's ministry expands.

So consider your gifts (you have them!) and consider your world (it's as near as your neighbor). Be bold to become a gift to others as you offer yourself in God's service in church and world. The point at which your gifts and the world's needs meet becomes holy ground.

My friend is right: "The gifts are in the people." The gifts are in you!

Alternate service on Saturday continues this month

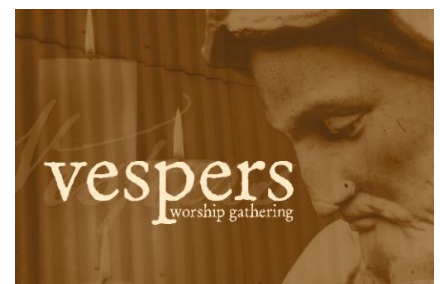

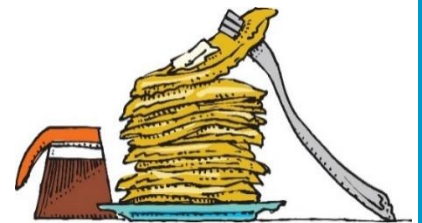


Pancake Day

2020 ANNUAL MEETING REVIEW

Holy Cross conducts its church business, appoints new officers and approves budgets for 2020

The annual meeting of Holy Cross Lutheran had more critical business to discuss than members had been used to in recent meetings. Not only was there the traditional, familiar election of officers and approval of budgets but also discussion on the key topic of scheduling worship service and Sunday School plus an update on the call process for a new pastor. There was also the return of individual commission reports after a four-year absence, and for the first time in Holy Cross history, an Interim Pastor, Rev. Dr. William Flammann, was present as spiritual leader.

Outgoing President Michele Vichiola-Van Wart called the meeting to order at 10:39 a.m. on January 26 in the Froehlich Fellowship Hall, where meeting attendees had been treated to brunch food supplied by the Board of Directors and organized by Kendra Norman. Following the singing of the hymn, "Thee Will I Love, My Strength, My Tower" (LSB #694) piano accompaniment by Sally Finck, there was an opening prayer by Pastor, who prayed for God's guidance. He urged the members to think about a vision for the church in the next five to 10 years and what small steps could be done now to accomplish it. The President welcomed the assembly of 62 people who signed the attendance sheet, which was enough for a quorum. Kerry Geffert was announced as Parliamentarian, Gary Messerschmitt as time manager.

The President reviewed the agenda and thanked several people, among them Pastor Flammann and Christine, Mary Schrock, Roger Burke, Michele Glennon and the preschool staff and the church's many volunteers.

The agenda continued with the approval of the meeting minutes from the 2019 Annual Meeting, and with reports from the individual commission directors, who stood before the group and talked about what the commissions had done. In order they were: Shepherds/Gary Jackson; Social Ministry/Stephanie Helminger and Kendra Norman; Worship/Ms. Finck; Discipleship/Julianne Nyitrai; Education/Kristen Messerschmitt; Evangelism/Dave Bogen; Technology/Gary Messerschmitt. Property Director Dan Senft was absent.



The next order of business was tied in with the 2019 Missouri Synod Convention. Voting congregations of the LCMS were asked to vote on adopted Resolution 9-05, "To Amend the Constitution to Address Individual Membership and Advisory Representation." The five effects of the resolution were made available to attendees, who voted on and passed the resolution. The Holy Cross vote ballot will be sent to the office of the Secretary of the Synod in St. Louis by the deadline of March 16.

Next up was the election of six officers: President, Sherry Duff; Financial Secretary, Chad Helminger (incumbent); Discipleship, Adela Buck and Kathy Boivie; Education, Kristen Messerschmitt (incumbent); Worship, Ms. Finck (incumbent); Shepherd, Pat and John Deloge. The Vice President position is open; there were no nominations from the floor. The slate was approved en masse by voice vote. In addition to the President, coming off the Board were Mr. Jackson and Ms. Nyitrai. The VP position had already been vacant.

The "delight" of any annual meeting—the financials—was up next. Financial Secretary Mr. Helminger presented income numbers for 2019. Actual income was \$303,792.76 against budget of \$308,218.62. The total member giving, including envelopes, flowers, memorials and dedicated accounts, was \$314,025. Treasurer Greg Dowling then reviewed the income and expense comparison. Church expenses for 2019 were \$296,703.61, for a surplus of \$7,089.15. Preschool actual expenses were \$231,174.39 versus actual income of \$244,124.02 for a surplus of \$12,949.63. Mr. Dowling then went over the 2020 budgets for church and preschool. Proposed church income was \$295,930.34 versus expenses of \$273,930.34 for a surplus of \$22,000. If that comes to fruition, it is believed the funds will need to be used for expenses related to the pastoral vacancy. For the preschool, proposed income was \$246,462.00 versus expenses of \$244,364.92 for a surplus of \$2,097.08. The budget proposals called for flat increases, except for a 2.3 percent increase in salaries; this reflects the District's recommendation for church staff. After discussion, a motion to pass the budgets as presented carried.

Under New Business, the primary topic was when to schedule the church's worship services and Sunday School/Adult Ed time. In the fall the church had gone to a 9 a.m. worship, 10:30 education (later changed to 10:15) start. It was a six-month trial that would end at the end of February. The meeting attendees were asked to discuss how to proceed, especially since the trial period did not produce positive results. The Board of Directors, and Pastor Flammann, favored the approach of keeping the 9 a.m. service through May when the 9 a.m. service would normally begin for the summer and then reverting to two services and 9:15 Sunday School in September. It was feared going to two services now, then to one for the summer, and then back to two in September might be confusing and not bring the desired results either. Waiting until September would allow for a "rally" back to the traditional schedule. Kerry Geffert moved "based on the Board's recommendation, that we continue the 9 a.m. service schedule to the end of May (with the exception of two services on Easter)* and that an ad hoc committee be formed immediately to determine the starting time to be in effect for the remainder of the school year, the decision to be made in two weeks and recommended to the Board. *Friendly amendment by Mary Schrock. The motion appeared to pass by voice vote, but in a show of hands, the motion carried, 31-14.

Rev. Flammann made remarks during a Pastor's Comments agenda item, urging the members to be hopeful, specifically for a pastor. He said, God knows who our pastor will be and when. He is a God of hope. Pastor concluded his remarks and the final agenda item with a traditional blessing. The meeting was adjourned at 12:44 p.m.

FINANCIAL NOTES

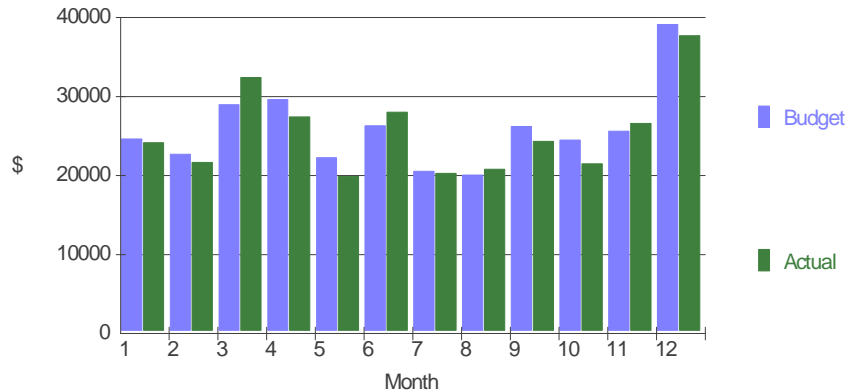
Annual giving summary provided for the calendar year 2019

First, thank you for all of your support! Overall, giving was slightly higher than prior year. However, it was less than the estimated needs to fund our mission at Holy Cross. Below is a summary of annual giving for daily operations:

OUR LENTEN FOCUS

Lent begins on February 26

Lent, the church-year season that begins on Ash Wednesday, is a time of penitence and spiritual renewal. Some people give up a luxury or vice during Lent as a form of self-denial; others undertake a project that benefits others.

The point isn't to denigrate ourselves or to see how much we can do without. Instead, Lent helps us reflect on Jesus' death. As Timothy Keller writes in *The Reason for God*: "The Christian Gospel is that I am so flawed that Jesus had to die for me, yet I am so loved and valued that Jesus was glad to die for me. This leads to deep humility and deep confidence at the same time. It undermines both swaggering and sniveling. I cannot feel superior to anyone, and yet I have nothing to prove to anyone. I do not think more of myself nor less of myself. Instead, I think of myself less."
