# FROM OUR INTERIM PASTOR Dear Members and Friends of Holy Cross,

Greetings in our Lord, Jesus Christ!

I invite you to think this month about darkness and light, and its effect upon our lives. I served a tremendous congregation in Rochester, New York, for eighteen and a half years. Rochester was a wonderful place for Christine and me to live, and we truly loved our time there, but...and there is a BUT...one of the challenging things about that part of western New York State is that it tends to be cold, damp and grey most days between late October and the middle of May. I know what you may be thinking (he's becoming like one of those caricatured old-timers who had to walk uphill to school not only in going, but also uphill in coming home, and he's going to say that there was a lot more snow in those days). Western New York, though, is one of those places where purveyors of sunlamps can make a fortune, for such lamps are among the arsenal of

weapons used to combat Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD), a condition that's brought on by too little natural light. Add the climate to the shortened hours of daylight in the winter season, and there's an effect, minor or acute, on much of the population.

It's not for nothing that our sacred scriptures should speak much of darkness and light, with darkness often serving as a metaphor for sin and evil, while light is a metaphor for the promise of dawn and, especially, the light that entered the world in the person of Jesus Christ. That light is referenced no few times in the first chapter of John's gospel where we read of Jesus, "The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world" (John 1:9).

I should add that western New York usually has magnificent summers, and residents of that region embrace the light enthusiastically and often give expression to how different they feel in the summer as opposed to the bleak midwinter.

We are on the cusp of Epiphany. Songs of Christmas, and especially Epiphany, move us from darkness to light:

"All out of darkness, we have light, Which made the angels sing this night: 'Glory to God and peace to men. Now and forevermore. Amen.'" (Hymn # 377)

"O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright! You shine with God's own truth and light." (Hymn # 395)

"Arise and shine in splendor; Let night to day surrender. Your light is drawing near." (Hymn # 396)

"Brightest and best of the stars of the morning, Dawn on our darkness and lend us thine aid." (Hymn # 400)

And there are more! The point is, the light of Christ is here, it illuminates, and it not only warms, but also guides us. The light is present. Look for it. This world, and these times, in which there is so much darkness, longs for the light. And you, Christian, know where to point!


### PRESIDENT'S JOURNAL

#### Reflect

A blessed Christmas season and a happy new year to you, your family, and your friends! I hope you found a place of faith-based celebration, renewal and refreshment. Has anyone made new year's resolutions? The decision is split with my family and friends as to whether or not resolutions are meaningful or useful. I find resolutions a helpful way to shake myself out of my comfort zone and put something new into motion. I respect others' opinions that resolutions are not helpful but a means to set ourselves up for disappointment, but caveat that there are well-made resolutions and prescriptions for failure. Resolutions do not have to be big to have meaning. Here are a few of mine from past years:

- 1. Reduce paper by setting up and referencing my documents online.
- 2. Set up college funds for my young nieces and granddaughter.
- 3. Schedule wellness exams and screenings.
- 4. Read daily Bible meditations and reflections.
- 5. Practice compassion and patience when frustrated.

I included my resolutions in my prayers and had various degrees of success with each; some are still in progress. Regardless of the outcome, I appreciated the discipline of active reflection on what I was doing and how I was doing it. I looked at where my time, attention and resources were being spent, and found that much was being wasted or neglected. The awareness was the essential first step in making a positive change. My resolutions for 2020 include detaching with love from my old church leadership roles and stepping into new church volunteer roles. I resolve to let go of what was and to let what does not serve a better purpose fall to the ground. Resolution out of reflection, ultimately to reflect God's abundant love as imperfect as I am.



During the Christmas bustle and celebrations, I strove to make time for reflection on the many gifts bestowed at Christmas: The incredible miracle of God made flesh in the human form of Baby Jesus, the preciousness of His birth, our renewal of spirit, hope and love, the ultimate act of never-failing love and humility, and the peace which passes our human understanding. I meditated on the dual meaning of reflect: To personally and internally reflect in a meditative and quiet manner, and to communally and externally reflect the light and love of God. Our Advent service from December 11 focused on reflected light, specifically how we reflect the light of Jesus as light of the world in our daily lives. What would our lives look like if we lived every moment in every situation as a reflection of God's love and light? Could we, as an instrument of God, point the way out of darkness to everyone around us? How would we be changed by living as God's love reflection? Even if you do not make resolutions, I wish you the gift of reflection.

God's peace and blessings in the coming year.



(Inclement weather date: Sunday, February 2, at 10:30 a.m.)




### HOLY CROSS WORSHIP SCHEDULE

### Alternate service on Saturday coming soon!

Worshipping at Holy Cross benefits from more than one option; so I'm very pleased to announce an alternate service time to 9 a.m. Sunday.

To answer our member responses needing an alternate worship time to Sunday morning, a Vespers Worship Service will begin in January 2020.



The service will be <u>at 5 p.m.</u>, on two Saturdays each in January and February. The dates are January 11 and 25, and February 8 and 22, weather permitting. Because these services will be led by lay leaders, Holy Communion will not be offered; the service will last about 30 to 40 minutes. Our Sunday service <u>at 9 a.m.</u> with Interim Pastor William Flammann will always have communion.

Future dates will be announced later; for now, these four dates take us to the end of the six-month trial period of a one-service Sunday schedule.

We pray the Saturday Vespers will serve those needing an alternative to the Sunday 9 a.m. service, and, when a new pastor is installed at Holy Cross, this alternate service will be expanded to include communion.

### LESSONS IN BEHAVIOR

### The power of love is transformative

Martin Luther King Jr., whose life and legacy we honor this month, spoke often about the power of love. In fact, he equated the practice of nonviolence with "absolute commitment to the way of love."

Love, declared the minister and activist, "is the only force capable of transforming an enemy into a friend." And, he said, anyone who's "devoid of the power to love" is "devoid of the power to forgive."

King distinguished between true love and "empty sentimentalism," however. He taught — and showed — that love is "the active outpouring of one's whole being into the being of another."

Jesus' sacrifice on the cross is the ultimate "active outpouring" of love, and we can choose to follow his example daily.

"Because of Calvary I'm free to choose," writes Max Lucado in *When God Whispers Your Name*. "No occasion justifies hatred; no injustice warrants bitterness. I choose love. Today I will love God and what God loves."
