UPDATED SERVICE GUIDELINES

In consideration of new CDC recommendations, as well as both State and Federal guidance, the following changes have been made to our weekly Sunday services:

- Sign-ups are no longer required.
- Masks are still required--*no exceptions*--until further notice. We will continue to monitor State and Federal guidance.
- We will discontinue checking temperatures upon entry into church. Please self-monitor and do not attend church if you're not feeling well.
- Use of hand sanitizer is strongly encouraged and will continue to be made available.
- The sanctuary will be divided into two sections: Pews 1 to 8: No social distancing Pews 9 to 15: Social distancing required
- Seating is "open" based on the above guidelines. If you choose to sit in pews 9 to 15, please social distance.
- Holy Communion is distributed as "continuous communion."

The Board of Directors will continue to monitor available guidance while being mindful of potential member concerns. Procedures and policies will be updated accordingly. Thank you for your support as we enter this new phase of our congregation's life.

GETTING TO KNOW THE ERBS, PART 1

Pastor Nathan Erb follows the same tracks eastward already trod by two of his predecessors

Pipelines are in the news on a regular basis, usually the oil type, although, sadly, gossip pipelines are notably "popular," too. But the oil kind often makes headlines because the U.S. president of a certain party will want to open them up and that of another party will want to close them down. Holy Cross has had its own fluid pipeline since its inception, ours of the pastoral type. This pipeline flows eastward from the Midwest, unlike that well-known Horace Greeley bit of career advice in the 1800s to "Go west, young man."

With the calling and acceptance of Pastor Nathan Erb to be Holy Cross' fourth shepherd, this pipeline that had been open, then closed, has been reopened!

Founding pastor/pastor emeritus Ronald Froehlich, a Wisconsin native, began the pipeline flow east, followed by Rev. Emil Witschy, a Chicagoan whose ministry was primarily here out east. Our third pastor, Eric Wismar, was already an Easterner but having spent time residing in Japan, he was a global pipeline traveler. Now with Pastor Erb, an Illinois native, the Midwest pipeline is back in the flow. (As an Illinoisan myself, I find that cause for celebration!)

As someone who likes to take note of historical parallels, similarities among our pastors will be fun to document. For instance, pastors Froehlich and Witschy both said "M*A*S*H" was their favorite TV show; Pastor Wismar continued that military emphasis with the great amount of time he spent with the National Guard as a chaplain. "M*A*S*H," I'm afraid, might be too old of a show for Pastor Erb and in some early "leaking" of his family's favorites, he had "Downton Abbey" as

his top TV show. But stay tuned for more on this. I'm also anxious to find out where Bach ranks among Pastor Erb's favorite composers? The great German has been No. 1 so far with the first three pastors.

Here's another comparison to the past: the Erb daughters will be the second time a set of three sisters lived in the parsonage since the Froehlichs' three girls, who also had a brother, Andrew.

And in a beautiful pattern of connectivity among our pastors, Pastor Erb served as DCE in his first called position at the same church, Trinity Lutheran, Hicksville, New York, that Pastor Froehlich served his vicarage in 1954-1955 and where his brother, Charles (Chip), served as associate pastor from 1974 to 1979 (he then served for 33 years at St. Luke, Dix Hills). Pastor Ron's wife, Judie, was a teacher as well at Trinity Lutheran in the 1950s. How is that for connecting our first pastor to the current one?! It doesn't stop there. Pastor Erb also served for 12 years as DCE and then Assistant Pastor at the Lutheran Church of the Resurrection, Garden City, New York, which was the longtime home of our extremely spirited Vacancy Pastor William Meyer, who is LCR's Pastor Emeritus. God works in mysterious and wonderful ways!



I'll conclude this first installment of "meeting the Erbs" with a portion of an introductory story about him that appeared in the November 2005 Garden City LCR newsletter when Pastor Erb was introduced as its DCE. The story said, "Recently, there has been much talk circulating the Lutheran Church of the Resurrection, and it is clear that 'Nathan Erb is the word.' Yes, he's got a groove, and he's got a feeling — a feeling to serve the Lord. Originally from the state of Illinois, Nathan attended Concordia University located just west of downtown Chicago. He planned to pursue his mission to God in becoming a Director of Christian Education (DCE), which is his purpose here today at Resurrection. According to Nathan, service fulfills one of the three 'S's' he follows in his ministry. 'Christian life is special and spiritual, which both involve service to God and one another,' he says. Nathan proves that every day as he serves in his work with the youth. He has organized numerous events for them to take part in the community and each other's lives."

Your faithful HC Word staff will do a second installment of "getting to know the Erbs" in the September edition, in which we hope to continue a lighthearted look at Holy Cross' new "first family." And be sure to make special note to view the narthex display case emphasis on the Erbs that will be organized by Mary Schrock as another tool in getting to know more about Pastor Erb, Elisabeth and their family. Mary expects to have it ready before July 11.

COVENANT TO CARE FOR CHILDREN

The back-to-school project kicks off early this summer with donations due on August 1

It hasn't even been a month for school to be out for the summer, but we are already focusing on providing new backpacks and school supplies for children in need for the 2021-2022 school year. Through our covenant with the State of Connecticut's Covenant to Care for Children program and Holy Cross' "adopted" DCF social worker, Mimose Ulysses-Laurenard, we have a promise to fulfill: Providing the 24 school-aged children in Mimose's caseload with a new backpack filled with necessary and fun school supplies.



Beginning July 4, look in the narthex for the large display board with pockets filled with 3-by-5 "shopping cards" for school supply items. Each card will list the specific item needed...backpacks, pens, colored pencils, pencil pouches, binders, pencils, pocket folders, markers, and so much more. The display board will remain in the narthex through the due date – August 1 – so watch for store sales throughout July. If you wish to make a donation of a backpack and/or school supplies, just take the appropriate "shopping cards" from the poster and return your donation(s) no later than August 1. While

I love watching our members hover in a group around the poster every year to select the shopping cards, <u>please respect</u> each other and try to remain physically distant, so that only one person is at the display board at a time.

If you are not able to shop, monetary donations for this project are welcomed. You may make a check out to Holy Cross Lutheran, and write "Cov to Care" in the memo section. Monetary donations may be put in the Covenant to Care mailbox *(bottom row, far right)* or mailed to the church office, and must be received by July 25 so that I can take inventory of items still needed. ALSO! If you are not coming to Holy Cross' in-person worship services, but would like to shop for school supplies, contact me at me personal e-mail address (below with my signature) and I can tell you what items are needed.

Thank you in advance for your generosity to help our church's adopted social worker as she works with children of all ages who are unfortunately removed from their home and placed into the DCF system.

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LEARN OF & BE INSPIRED BY SCRIPTURE

The Holy Cross Word monthly "Bible study on paper": Acts, Chapter 4

Editor's note: To do this study, you will need to open your own Bible in front of you, of whatever version you prefer, or you can go to a website such as BibleGateway.com, and enter the Bible version you prefer and this Bible passage—Acts 4—in the appropriate search fields.

Acts, Chapter 4, 37 verses—This chapter continues to show the excitement of the church's early growth, a wonderful example of enthusiasm needed today at Holy Cross as a new pastor soon begins his ministry here among us. And the chapter is a continuation of how growth is achieved through the Christian leaders and followers being tested, sometimes in a starkly challenging way. Please pause now to open your Bible of whatever translation you prefer or a web page such as BibleGateway.com to Acts, Chapter 4, and read the full chapter.

Chapter analysis—

Okay, let's take a closer look at Chapter 4. Chapter 3 ended with Peter, in explaining the miracle of the lame man who could now walk and the ministry of Christ, giving a rebuke to the killing of Jesus by those who didn't know any better, but it was part of the fulfillment of God's plan, he said. Up to this point, his audience "had taken" Peter's verbal punches of its culpability in Jesus' death, but Chapter 4 shows the opposition was ready to attack. As Peter and John were making their comments, now in the evening, temple priests and the Sadducees moved to arrest them because they did not approve of the two speaking about Jesus' sacrifice and rising, His promised resurrection from the dead. But their arrest did not influence the believers, however. Approximately 5,000 people heard and believed the message.

The next day Peter and John were confronted by the ruling council's leaders: Annas, Caiaphas and other elders and scribes of the high-priestly family. Standing before their inquisitors, the two were asked by whose power did they make the statements they spoke, even though Peter and John had already told them that information. Observe in verse 8 how Peter responds, but only after it was noted he was filled with the Holy Spirit. The Greek word used to describe this moment refers to an immediate filling by the Holy Spirit and is along the lines of what Jesus said "the Helper" would do for believers who spoke in His name. Remember how as Christians we are always advised that in our weakness we will be inspired to know what to say by the Holy Spirit. Peter was no different, and he must have felt the Spirit's power to refrain

from admonishing with, "You weren't listening yesterday because I've told you this already!" Instead he gave a mini-version of his message, once again citing Jesus Christ as the source of the disciples' power and of salvation.

Peter's consistent tone and eloquence and bold adherence to his message helped him. Both he and John were perceived to be uneducated and ordinary by their accusers, not specially trained teachers. They weren't deserving of respect but rather to be scorned. But their persuasive tone earned them begrudging respect. With the support of the lame man they healed, who was described to be in his 40s, standing next to them, Peter and John weren't questioned anymore. Instead, they exited the council so the accusers could discuss what to do. And as typically happens with those in power, they didn't want to lose that power and in an effort to "control the message" they told Peter and John they recognized a great event happened with Christ as well as the lame man but they were ordered to put a news blackout on what

happened and not tell anyone about it. Such an order, of course, was counter-intuitive to what the disciples had been told to do and in verses 19 and 20 they tell the council so. They are threatened again, but the council didn't have the stomach to do any kind of punishment because they had seen how the people believed in the disciples and praised God. The council was reluctant to do anything because Peter and John had been effective in getting a strong response from the people to show their faith.

Afterward, the two disciples rejoined their friends or "their own" in some translations, and after reporting on their last 24 hours, went into prayer, asking for continued strength and boldness during challenges to their faith. Afterward, they once again experienced a strong intake of the Holy Spirit, but not as on Pentecost, since that was a singular event.

The group of believers felt unified over the challenge to Peter and John, as seen in their subsequent prayer and Holy Spirit infusion, and they were moved more than ever to show how they were unified in heart and soul by putting all they had together in one collection so no one person had more than the other and all they had could be used for the common good of the church. Anyone who owned property, for example, sold it and the money was put together for Peter and John to ensure that each believer had enough as they needed. There is even a specific example cited of Barnabas selling a field and bringing the money to Peter and John.

Today we often talk about how the Christian church operates on the practice of free-will offerings, and examples such as this in Acts demonstrate what that is based on. The next chapter will show how quickly, however, some of the believers couldn't follow this practice for long.

The power of listening: How we listen helps us speak volumes

"The most basic and powerful way to connect to another person is to listen," says Dr. Rachel Naomi Remen, author and integrative medicine professor. "Perhaps the most important thing we ever give each other is our attention."

Twice in Mark 4, while teaching, Jesus urges, "Let anyone with ears to hear listen" (verses 9 & 23, NRSV). One way we show what Jesus means to us is by truly listening to his word — not just hearing sounds but being attentive and intentional.

Likewise, one way we love and serve others is by respectfully listening to them: not assuming we know what they feel or mean or will say; not planning what to say even as they're still speaking,



And he said, "He who has ears to hear, but listening deeply to learn about them and their experience.

We often think living our faith calls for great

accomplishments or worldwide reach. But Remen says, "A loving silence often has...power to heal and to connect." Don't underestimate something as basic and doable as listening as a way to practice Christlike love.


