FROM OUR VACANCY PASTOR

November begins with All Saints' Day, a reminder of our relationship with God and each other

October 31 is Halloween. November 1 is All Saints' Day. Is there a relationship between the two?

According to Wikipedia, All Saints' Day was formally introduced into the Church Year by Pope Gregory III in 731 AD when he dedicated a chapel at St. Peter's in Rome. The intent then was to honor specific Christians who were well-known for their lives of witness or martyrdom.

All Hallows Eve is thought to have originated in Ireland some 2000 years ago as a pagan festival during which souls of the dead would appear on this date and walk among the living. As years passed and people became Christian, the evening before All Saints' Day was called Hallowed Eve. Down through the years, the two evening traditions morphed into what we now know as Halloween – a secular celebration that's fun for the entire family. 
Halloween is big business today – just behind Thanksgiving and Christmas. It is estimated that more than 9 billion dollars will be spent this year on costumes, decorations, candy and cards. I can't wait to see what outfits my young granddaughters will wear this year.

All Saints' Day is a religious event when we ponder the word "saints."

There are the saints from Biblical times. They are the authors of the Bible and countless men and women from the Biblical period and the years that followed. Then there are the men and women who "died in the Lord." These could be your parents or mine. They could be other deceased members of your family or relationships, or members of this congregation. We sometimes honor these persons at graveside. My parents are buried with my grandparents in Flushing, N.Y., and Marie's parents are buried in Kensico Cemetery in Valhalla, N.Y., and we visit whenever we can.

Saints are also fellow living, beathing Christians. They are your fellow members here at Holy Cross as well as family members who live elsewhere. A saint is any person who

confesses Jesus Christ as Lord. We celebrate these people every time we confess the Creed and say "I believe in the communion of saints." Read: "community of saints" – the blessed fellowship of God's people wherever they may live.



So, the next time you look into a mirror, recognize yourself as a "saint" - and thank God!


PRAISE GOD FOR HIS ABUNDANT GOODNESS!

FINANCIAL NOTES

Offering update provided for the first nine months of 2020





The weekly envelope giving has totaled \$181,318 through the end of September. This is less than the budget amount of \$191,000. As we make the journey back to in-person services, your ongoing support has been greatly appreciated. Despite the ongoing challenges, we have much to be thankful for and your support of the church has been steadfast. Thank you for your generosity!

A few other items to highlight:

- We have a net surplus through September of \$388.
 - Our income is less than budget primarily due to the reduction of in-person services.
 - The Board and our staff continue to be diligent in managing expenses wherever possible given our reduced income. Expenses have been lower than budget due to lower personnel costs, utilities, and worship supplies.
 - With that said, we do anticipate future costs for maintenance projects and tree removal over the next few months to maintain our church and property.
- Vanco e-giving continues to be a very convenient (and touchless!) option utilized by many of our members...almost 2/3rds of our giving. There are two ways to give electronically: via the website or via the "Give Plus" app.

The Board hopes you find this update valuable, and we thank you for your continued support. Please let us know if you have any questions.

November will be a month to give emphasis to the many blessings God gives us daily



COVENANT TO CARE FOR CHILDREN

Annual "Giving Tree" will be presented by mid-November

As I write this article in mid-October, Halloween decorations adorn lawns and an abundance of candy is on store shelves. But I have also seen Christmas decorations and cards already in stock in a couple grocery stores! And that ties into the fact that I'm already preparing for the annual Covenant to Care for Children "Giving Tree." I have been in close contact with Mimose Laurenard, our "adopted" DCF social worker, and despite the physical distancing of COVID, she will be able to

deliver Christmas gifts to the children in her caseload. Mimose will be doing her best to get me an updated caseload list with gift suggestions for the children by mid-November, so it will be my goal to have the "Giving Tree" poster in the narthex by Sunday, November 15 (November 22 at the latest). For many of the children, this will be the only Christmas gift he or she will receive.

For the past three years we have also given each child a hat & mitten/glove set, which was a very "warm" and welcoming addition to the Christmas gift, and I will hope to do that again this year. Any time this month prior to seeing the "Giving Tree" poster, if you feel so moved to purchase a winter hat & mitten/glove set, you may leave it in the red "snowflake" collection box in the narthex. (Please, no "hand-me-down" sets; due to COVID these items must be brand new.) If more hats and mittens are needed by the time the "Giving Tree" is presented, ornament tags for these will be included on the poster.

I realize that not all Holy Cross members are comfortable attending Worship in-person and may not have the opportunity to be at the church when this "Giving Tree" poster is presented. Please—if you would like to participate by having a child's name and gift suggestion, contact me via my personal email address: schrocknroll@optonline.net. I will match up a child to you and send you the information needed for you to purchase the gift.

As you are making preparations for the upcoming Christmas season, I hope you will include in your gift-giving list a Christmas gift and/or hat & mitten/glove set for one of the children that is under the care of DCF through the Covenant to Care. The gifts need to be turned in, *unwrapped*, and are due no later than Wednesday, December 9; this early due date gives me time to get the gifts wrapped and into Mimose's hands for delivery the week of December 14. And if you would like to provide a gift bag and tissue paper for the gift you are giving, I will certainly accept and appreciate that!! Thank you in advance for your support of this ministry to benefit children in crisis and in need.
