HEAD TO THE HEART

Time for something new

Solomon asked God for the gift of Wisdom, and it was given to him because God could see in Solomon's heart that he wanted to lead his people well. And so, if Solomon has wisdom directly from God, we would do well to listen to what he has to say. Solomon wrote, in Ecclesiastes 1:9, *"Whatever has been is what will be again, and whatever has already been done is what will be done again. There is nothing new under the sun."*

According to Solomon, although the circumstances might be different – humankind will never encounter something that has not already been experienced by another. There is no great triumph or tragedy that has

not already taken place. This is also the power of studying history. We look back to see what others did when a similar event took place. What did they get right – and what did they get wrong? Of course, this doesn't only apply to countries and governments but even a family has a history and lessons that can be learned from the past. A congregation, like ours, is the same. You can look at the display case in the narthex, and see some of the important moments in Holy Cross' history. It's a reminder of some of the great things that have happened over the years, but it's also a reminder that some things are no more.

Solomon also wrote these famous words *"For everything, there is an appointed time. There is an appropriate time for every activity under heaven."* Here are a few of those times; a time to give birth and a time to die, a time to tear down and a time to build, a time to keep and a time to throw away." What time are we in as a congregation?

A little over a year ago, you called me to be your pastor. Many of you expressed that it was time for something new. This doesn't mean that the things of the past are worthless. No, at the right time, they were

effective to do what they were intended to do. But we are at a different time. And sometimes, to do something new means we let go of what was. This isn't always easy. It might mean that in order to build we have to tear down. It might mean, that for new things to emerge, some will have to go away.

You've heard about some of the important things and decisions we will have to make about our current facility. There are some hard choices to make, which might lead to hurt feelings. And there will be challenges to face, which might lead to frustration. But what will help us do this together is to focus on our mission, to proclaim God's love and wisdom to a world that needs to hear it. This is the exciting part! Praying continually, thinking creatively, and working collaboratively, all while keeping these other words from Solomon in mind: *"I know that everything God does will last forever. Nothing can be added to it or taken away from it. God makes whatever has already passed come again."*



We need additional volunteers so that we can offer as many services online as possible. Thank you in advance for considering to volunteer for this important ministry. If interested, please contact me.



PRESIDENT'S JOURNAL

Yet another challenge faces us in the undercroft; your response is critical

I write this on the evening that we filled a second dumpster with items from our building's undercroft (aka lower level). If you are not familiar with what has been transpiring, here is a short recap: We have known for many worse that we had a maintum "aituation" in the undercroft. Becaut are

years that we had a moisture "situation" in the undercroft. Recent professional testing confirmed that our situation has become more of a problem, to the extent that use of the space, particularly by our children and Sunday School teachers, is no longer viable without remediation. And if we are honest with ourselves, the furnishings no longer contributed to a positive, healthy learning environment. So things had to go – two very tightly packed dumpsters worth.

So now what? That's the proverbial \$64,000 question. Purchasing new furnishings without addressing the central issue – excessive moisture – sets us

up for a repeat in the future. Plus, we have other issues that require attention, such as upgraded restrooms on both floors. And then there are the wish list items, including a more modern, welcoming narthex; a new sound and recording system; and an updated kitchen. But I digress; back to the undercroft. How do we want to use this space over the next five years, or 25 years? How will this impact the rest of our facility?

Obviously we have big decisions to make. We know that we need to enlist the aid of professionals who can help us understand what remediation must occur, as well as those who can help us think creatively about the use of our facility. This will take time, and of course, funding.

What does this mean for you? I ask for your patience as we move forward; this will not be a quick fix. And when the opportunities occur (and they will!), I hope you will share your ideas, your active participation, and your support – both emotional and financial. May we all remember that we are doing this not just to enhance our own worship experiences, but also to provide an environment where others will feel welcomed and feel that here they have a church home.

LEARN FROM & BE INSPIRED BY SCRIPTURE

The Holy Cross Word monthly "Bible study on paper": Acts, Chapter 16

Acts, Chapter 16, 40 verses—In this section of Acts in which the spread of the Christian church is shown expanding overseas and to "the ends of the earth," Chapter 16 focuses on the disciple Timothy.

Please pause now to read the full Chapter 16 of Acts (use a home Bible or an aid such as BibleGateway.com if needed).

Chapter 16 analysis—

More than halfway through Acts, we have seen leaders of the early church remain vigilant, bold and focused through a series of challenges to their message of Christ the Savior. Through it all the church continued to grow and expand, in both numbers and geographically.










After Chapter 15 ends with Paul selecting Silas to go with him on his second missionary journey through Syria and Cilicia (Asia Minor) to uphold the churches there, Chapter 16 describes Paul going to Derbe, Lystra and Iconium, where Timothy lived; he was a disciple and son of a Jewish mother and believer and had a Greek father. Timothy was held in high regard and Paul eagerly had him join him on the missionary trail. In Verse 5 they are recognized for their success: "So the churches were strengthened in the faith and increased in numbers daily."



They went through the regions of Phrygia, Galatia—were prevented from going into Asia—continued to Troas, and by a vision were sent to Macedonia. That experience begins with Verse 11, but in Verse 10 the narrative includes the word "we", indicating Luke is part of the journey. The Macedonian ministry is described in vignettes, with one horrific event followed by a miraculous one:

In Philippi, where they encountered Lydia, a God worshipper and fabric dealer. Her household was baptized and she hosted the missionaries in her house.

Paul had exorcised a demon out of a slave girl who had been telling fortunes but who had been hounding the missionaries. The girl's owners were angered to have their income silenced and they led a strong response to have Paul and Silas beaten, jailed and put in stocks. But one day around midnight, when the two were in prayer and singing, a severe earthquake struck, breaking the jail foundation and opening the cell doors. But the prisoners remained, and Paul told the jailer not to hurt himself for he feared he'd be in trouble for letting prisoners escape. The moment overwhelmed the jailer, who asked Paul and Silas how he could be saved. They spoke

the saving truth to him and he and his family were baptized. They brought the two into their house, bandaged their wounds and fed them.

In the morning the local magistrates told the jailer to set the two free, but Paul boldly pointed out that their release needed to be done properly. They had been beaten in public, he wanted them to be released in public, not on the sly. The message for us today is that Christians should not pass on using their rights to protect their own person. Concluding the chapter, when the magistrates learned that the two were Roman citizens it frightened them and they came and apologized for their treatment of the missionaries, who left the prison for Lydia's home, and after encouraging the people there, they left the city.

COVENANT TO CARE FOR CHILDREN

31 children in need within the greater-Trumbull community receive backpacks and school supplies

Again this year Holy Cross members and friends provided more than \$2,000 worth of backpacks and school supplies to the children that are in the caseload of Holy Cross "adopted" DCF social worker, Mimose Ulysse-Laurenard. It's been nearly 25 years that Holy Cross has taken part in the Covenant to Care for Children ministry,



and it's really hard to decide which of our three projects is more fun for everyone, but I give the edge to the back-to-school project. We received two extra backpacks, "just in case your social worker needs more," and the final tally of all school supplies indicated we received more than we asked for. What a blessing! Thank you to everyone for supporting this important social ministry project.

Many families take for granted that they will send their children to school with a backpack and school supplies. For children in the caseload of our DCF social worker, they don't have

the means or the parental support to go back-to-school shopping. Whether you donated 4 boxes of crayons, or 10 backpacks, or a box of a dozen binders, or two packages of glue sticks, collectively you all stepped in to provide 31 backpacks completely filled with more than 20 different school supply items. And Mimose also received three extra bags of various school supply items. The disadvantaged children receiving these filled backpacks not only come from Bridgeport, but Stratford, Fairfield, Easton, Trumbull and Wilton.

Again this year, I applied for and was approved for a Thrivent Financial Action Team. After filling out a simple online application describing this community-outreach project, the project was approved and Thrivent provided me with "Live Generously" T-shirts and a \$250 Visa gift card which was used to purchase the supplies needed to set up the project and supplement the purchasing of a few other needed supplies. Special thanks to Karen and Kerry Geffert, Stephanie Helminger, and Alexis and Donna Rodriguez for spending time on the early evening on August 17 to serve as our Thrivent Action Team of

volunteers. They all had fun filling the backpacks and tagging each one with the child's name. Extra thanks to Stephanie for sorting the supplies as they were received on Sunday mornings in July. Mimose picked up the backpacks on August 23, and she was planning to begin delivering them right away.

Please know that you helped to give all the backpack recipients a good start to the 2022-23 school year, along with a bit of extra love and self-confidence. Starting the school year can be overwhelming to children especially with a new school, new teachers, new friends and issues with their at-home lives that can give them anxiety. Now they have less stress about how they can afford a new backpack and school supplies.


